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#### 1. About the college



St. Xavier's Institute of Education (Autonomous) is the oldest Government aided, Christian minority Teacher Education College for the course (B.Ed., and Ph.D.) affiliated to the University of Mumbai and recognized by the National Council for Teacher Education (N.C.T.E.). Besides, it has various courses and extension services for students, teachers and the society. St. Xavier's Institute of Education (Autonomous) is a Christian minority College, established and administered by the Jesuit Mumbai Province of the Society of Jesus.

Before the Institute came to be located in the present premises at Churchgate, it started out in the premises of St. Xavier's College in June 1953. In 1953, when the Institute was granted affiliation to Bombay University, Fr. Angel Solagran started the B.Ed. Degree Course. He was the architect and founder of SXIE and SXBA and its first Superior and Principal. In 1955, it took over the Dip. Ed. Course from St. Xavier's College and for a long time was the only college affiliated to the Bombay University to run this course, till its discontinuance by the University in 1977.

The B.Ed Degree Course is a full time two—year Course. It combines theory with practical and includes regular lectures, practice teaching, lesson observation, community work, internship programme, preparation of instructional materials & teaching aids and project work. computer literacy, physical fitness, emotional health and the use of educational technology are also included.

The College has completed 70 years as a Teacher Education College par excellence, with alumni ranging from Principals of various colleges, a Vice Chancellor of Mumbai University and Heads of Department of Education. The College aims at imparting Quality Teacher Education and all round development. The College stands for academic excellence and the development of skills, and strives after character formation based on the love of God and the service of man. It seeks to educate citizens distinguished for their integrated development and sincere commitment to God and country, leading lives that are socially meaningful.

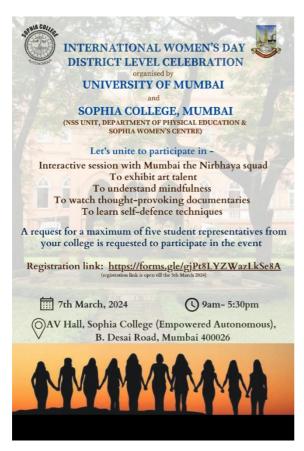


The KASHISH Forward at Sophia College, held as a part of Mumbai Queer Pride on January 18, 2024 at Sophia College.

<u>Analysis</u>: The institution has a good participation of the male and female gender in the governance of the institution. The staff meeting is also participative, with the agenda being contributory to a democratic decision making at the staff meeting.

#### GENDER SENSITIVE INFRASTRUCTURE/DISPLAYS/PROGRAMS

- i. <u>AWARENESS:</u> Charts were made by students to make everyone aware of the different acts and policies. It was displayed on the notice boards for viewing. Assemblies display gender related themes, where reflection on issues related to gender are discussed.
- **SOCIALISATION:** Ladies Common room for girls and Boys Common Room for Boys are provided. The college doesnot have any provision for the third gender. However the college is open to admitting the transgender students in the institution. The admission form has the option where the students can declare their gender.
- **SAFETY:** CCTV cameras are provided on every floor and in the classrooms for protection. Lighting on every floor is ensured for safety. Intercom system is

provided in the building-college office, staff room, library for quick communication. Intercom is also provided in the lift. Security guards are provided at the entrance of the building. They check the identity of the people coming in and going out of the building. The support staff on the  $3^{\rm rd}$ ,  $4^{\rm th}$  and  $5^{\rm th}$  floors are also vigilant. Lady attendant is especially provided for girls.

- iv. <u>HEALTH:</u> Cleanliness is maintained in all floors as well as the toilets. Separate toilets for girls and boys are provided. Sanitary pad vending machine is installed in the Ladies Common Room. Regular sessions on health related topics are conducted by the Health cell. A health check up was organized. First Aid box is provided with common medication for headaches, and other small ailments.
- v. <u>CONNECTING WITH AUTHORITIES:</u> Grievance cell, Internal complaints committee are active in the college. Inclusion policy will be drafted for inclusion.
- vi. GOOD AMBIENCE: Good infrastructure is provided in the classroom for learning. Multipurpose classroom and Auditorium is used for display of talents. Internet facilities are provided in every floor, and students can access the college wi fi on the fifth floor.
- vii. SUPPORT FOR WELL-BEING: Counsellor service is provided by the college where students can discuss their problems and get solutions. Mentoring is provided by the faculty members regularly. Parent Interact program is organized and parents interact with mentors and share the problems of their ward if any. Faculty members coach and guide the students for teaching skills and develop each student keeping in mind their ability. Child care leave was provided to female employees for taking care of their own children's studies and preparation for the HSC and SSC exams. Scholarships are provided to students under government schemes. All students are encouraged for indoor and outdoor games as well as participation in sports day events irrespective of their genders.
- viii. **READING FACILITY:** Library has a separate section on gender studies and has 64 books in the section "Women Studies and Gender". The faculty and the librarian encourage students to read those books.
- **SYLLABUS:** The Gender, School and Society paper in Semester 1 is done through a lot of activities in order to sensitize students about gender issues. Creating and Inclusive school, a paper in the B.Ed. program also provides incite into gender issues.

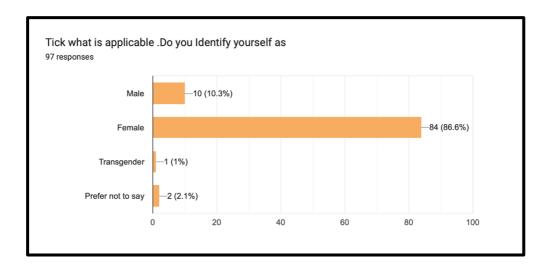

GRAPH S1 GENDER DISTRIBUTION



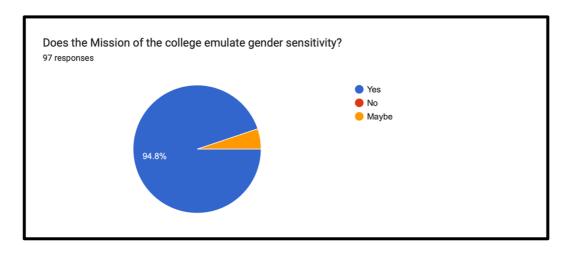

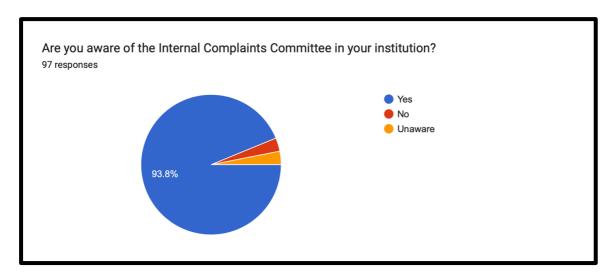
GRAPH S2 MISSION OF THE COLLEGE

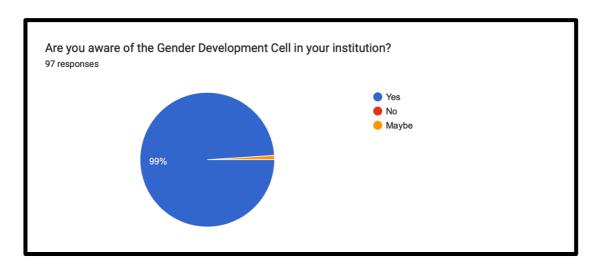

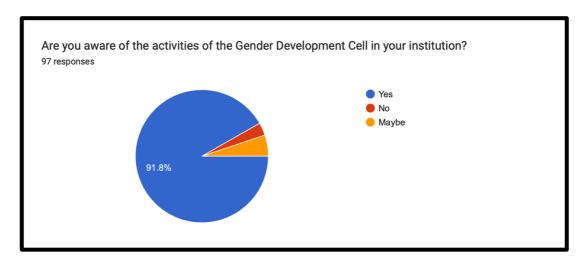

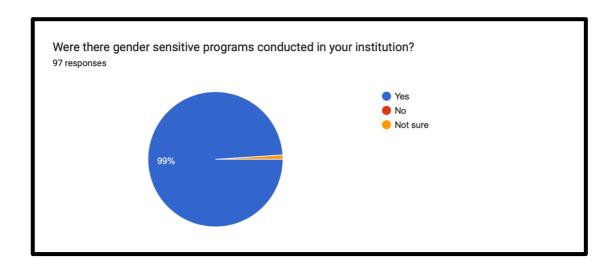

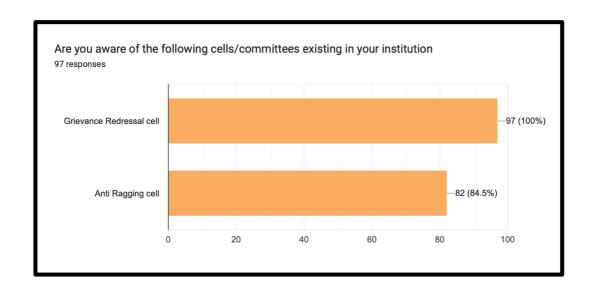
GRAPH S6

The Gender Cell of the college conducts the gender sensitive programs in the institution. The programs were well attended by the students. 99% of students agreed that such programs were conducted for the students.

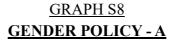

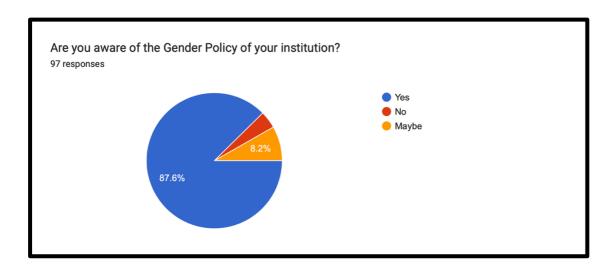

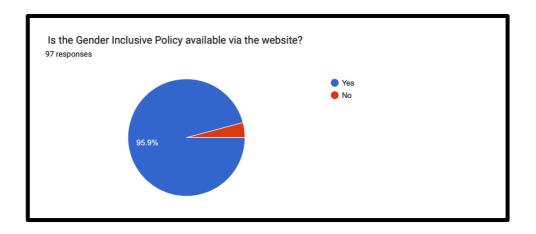
#### **GENDER POLICY OF THE INSTITUTION**

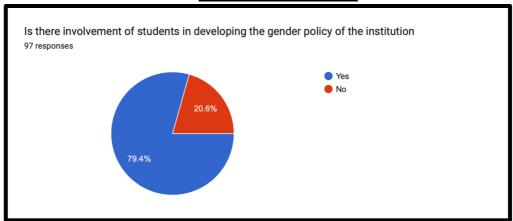
GRAPH S9 GENDER POLICY - B

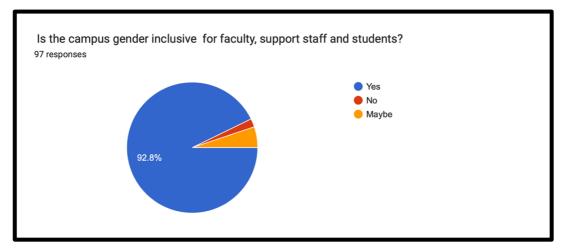

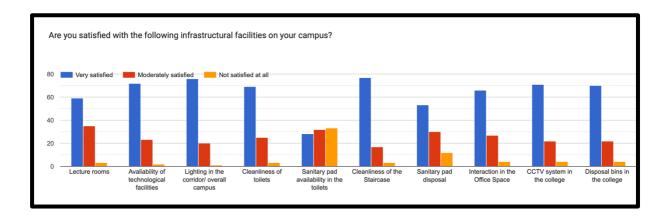
GRAPH S11

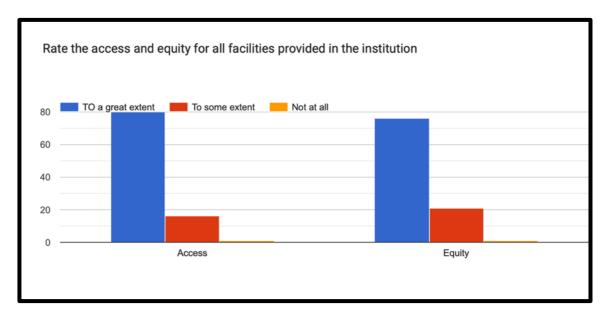

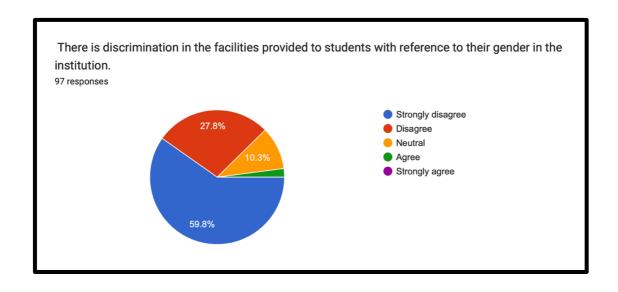

88% of the students have reported that there is no discrimination in the facilities provided with reference to their gender, 10% were neutral and 2% of the students agreed with this statement. With 12% of the class neutral and agreeing to the statement, the institution must check the reasons why the students feel the discrimination.

Rate the quality of interpersonal relationships with other students

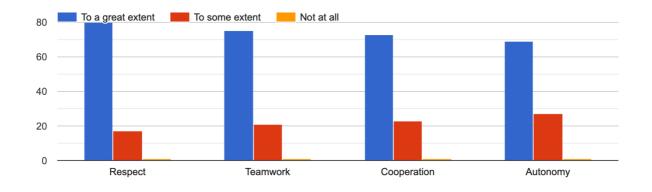

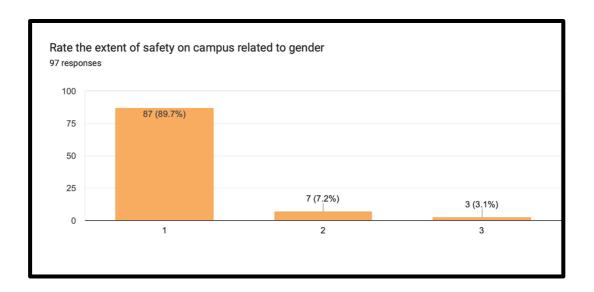

CAMPUS SAFETY

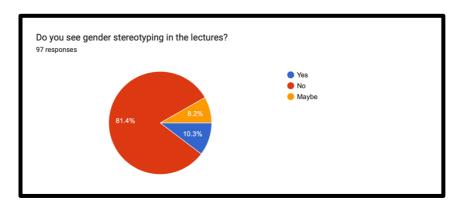

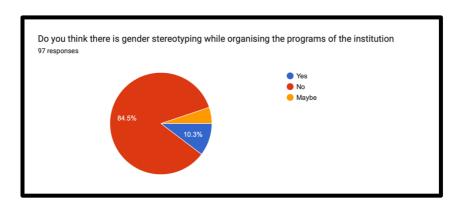
GRAPH S17 GENDER STEREOTYPING - A

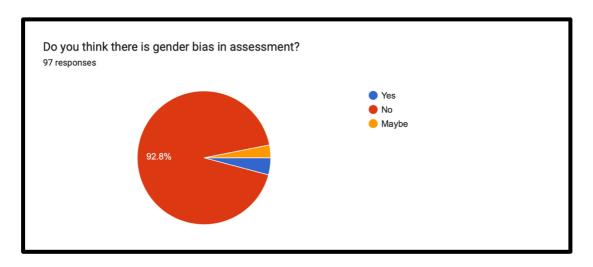

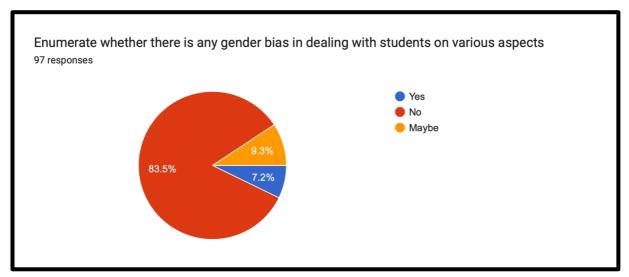

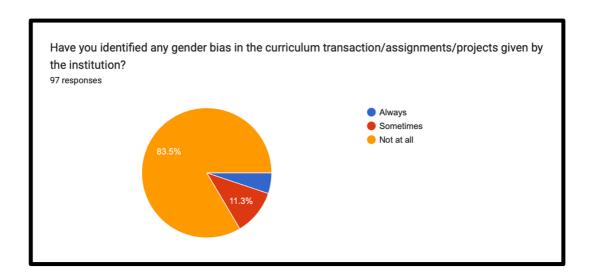

has a heavy internship component which requires dealing with lot of student issues, along with this activities like community work, assignments, projects, and other activities of internal assessment.

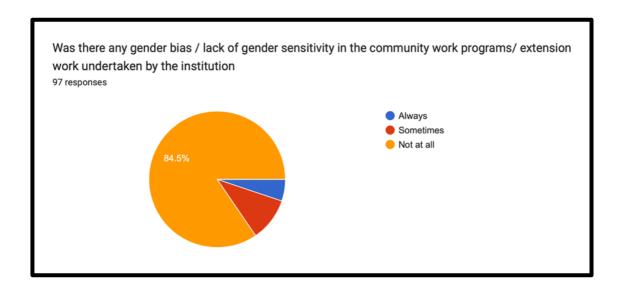

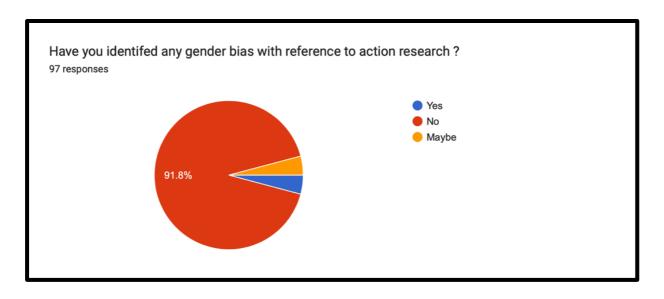

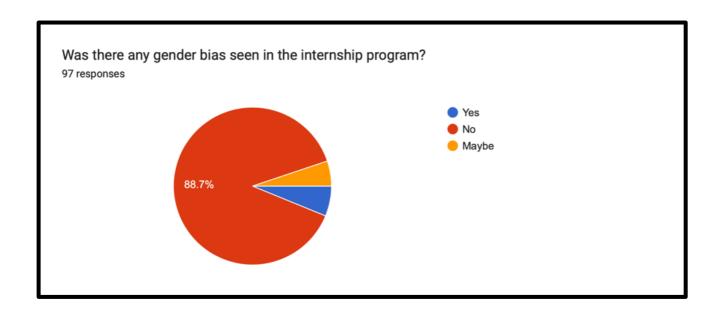

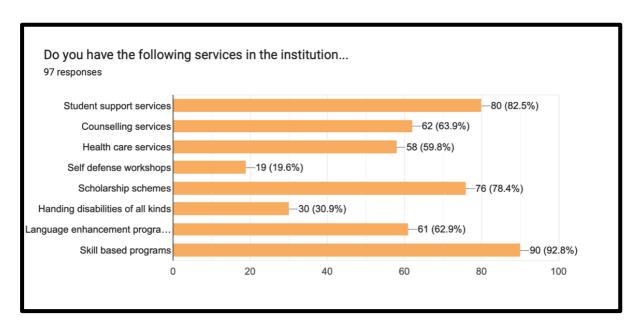

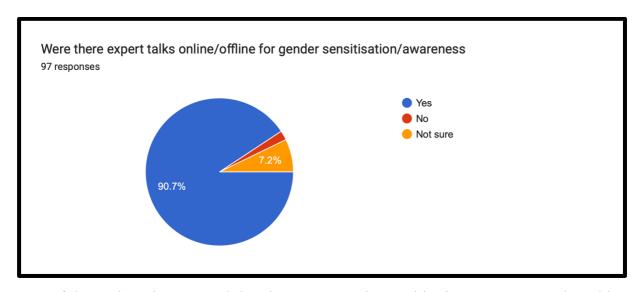
#### GRAPH S25 STUDENT SERVICES

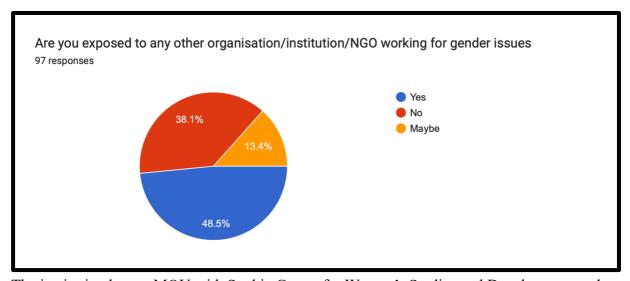
# GRAPH S26 GENDER AWARENESS PROGRAMS

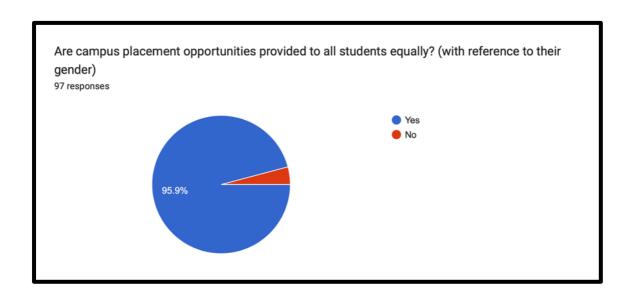
# GRAPH S27 **EXPOSURE TO OTHER ORGANISATIONS**

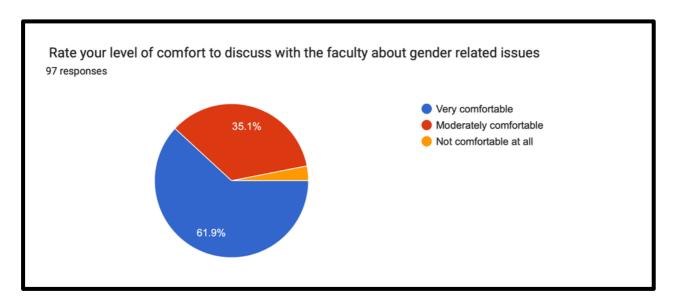

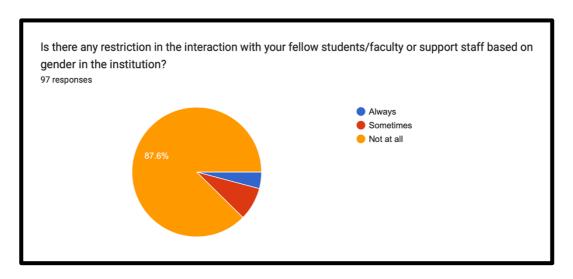
GRAPH S29 FACULTY DISCUSSIONS

#### **ANALYSIS OF THE FACULTY GENDER AUDIT**

The Gender audit data was collected from the faculty members including the principal. The major categories of questions in the data are:

#### 1. Demographic Information -

• Gender Identity

- Awareness of college mission on gender sensitivity
- Awareness of Internal Complaints Committee
- Awareness of Gender Development Cell and its activities
- Awareness of various institutional committees and policies

#### 3. Participation & Engagement

- Participation in Gender Development Cell programs
- Awareness of campus placement opportunities with gender equality

#### 4. Perception of Gender Sensitivity

- Comfort discussing gender issues with faculty
- Identification of gender bias in curriculum, assignments, or projects
- Gender bias in community work, research, and internship programs
- Restrictions in interactions based on gender

#### 5. Discrimination & Institutional Practices

- Perceived discrimination in faculty management decisions
- Gender bias in portfolio assignments

#### **Suggestions for Improvement**

• Open-ended feedback for institutional gender sensitivity enhancements

#### Takeaways from the Faculty Gender Audit Responses: (QUALITATIVE)

#### 1. Gender Distribution:

In this case, the majority of respondents were female (8), while only 1 male participated.

#### 2. Awareness of Gender Policies and Committees:

Around 100% (9 out of 9) of the respondents were aware of the mission of the college on gender sensitivity, the Internal Complaints Committee, and the GDC.

#### 3. Participation in GDC Programs:

Among the participants, various programs were mentioned:

• Celebration of Women's Day

- Kashish International Film Festival
- Workshops on Gender Sensitivity
- Program against Gender-Based Violence

#### 4. Perceived Gender Bias in Institutional Activities:

- 6 out of 9 participants identified gender bias in Curriculum.
- 8 out of 9 participants perceived gender bias in Community Work.
- 8 out of 9 identified gender bias in Research.
- Satisfaction with Internship Programs was moderate, with 2 respondents expressing moderate satisfaction, but 7 were happy with it.

#### **5.** Perceived Discrimination in Faculty Matters:

- 7 out of 9 voices of assurance state there is no gender-based discrimination in faculty management systems.
- One respondent felt "Not satisfied at all" regarding portfolio assignments.

#### 6. Comfort in Discussing Gender Issues:

- 7 respondents felt very comfortable discussing gender issues.
- However, one respondent answered "No," while one was "unsure" of that fact and said, "Maybe."

#### **Conclusion:**

While wide awareness existed about the gender policy, concerns were raised regarding gender bias in the curriculum, research, and community work.

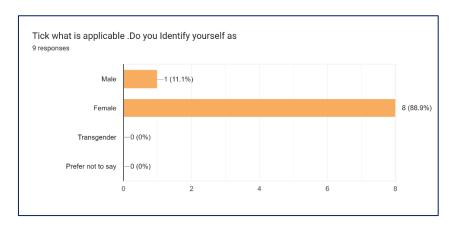
Faculty were broadly satisfied with gender inclusiveness in management but expressed doubt in respect to portfolio assignments.

Gender discussions are mostly welcomed, but there are some reservations present in a few faculty members.

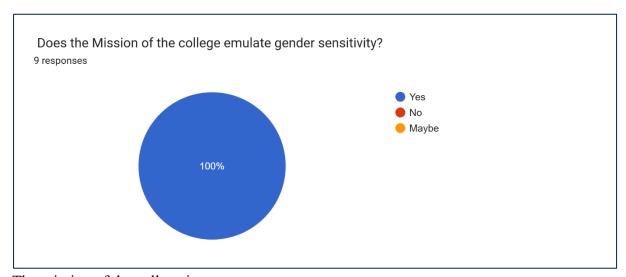

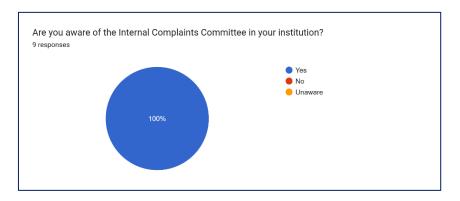

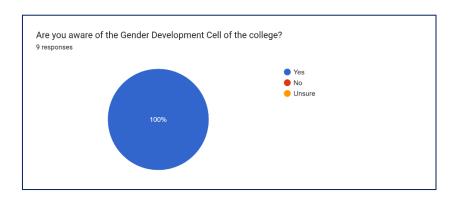

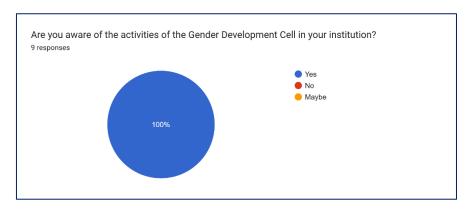

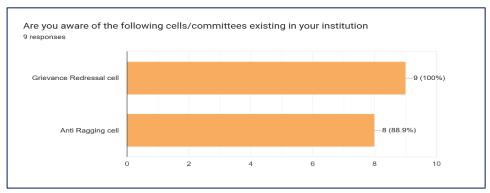

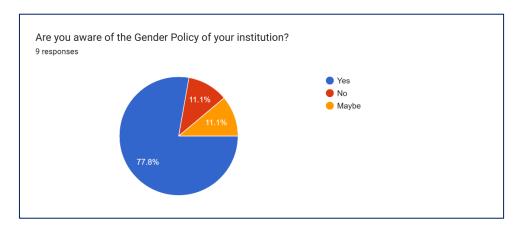

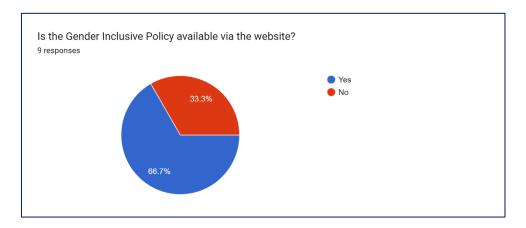

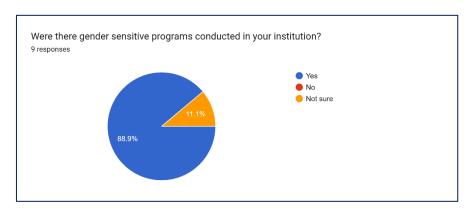
GRAPH F8 GENDER POLICY - B

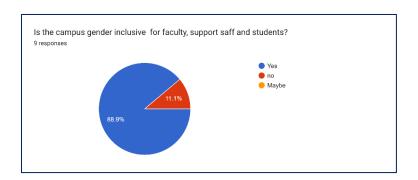
# GRAPH F9 GENDER SENSITIVE PROGRAMS

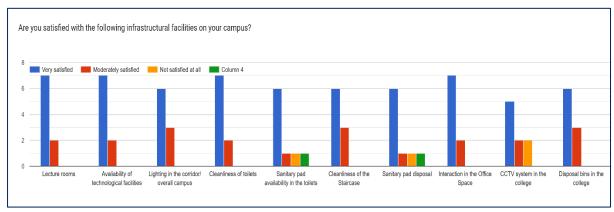
# GRAPH F10 GENDER INCLUSIVE CAMPUS

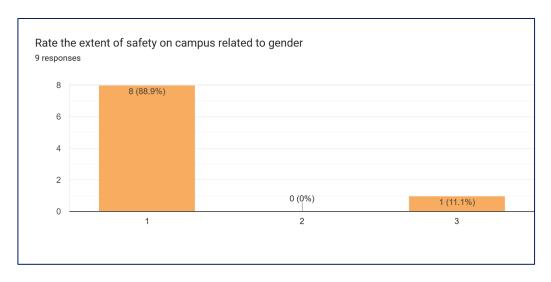
## GRAPH F11 GENDER BASED INFRASTRUCTURAL FACILTIES

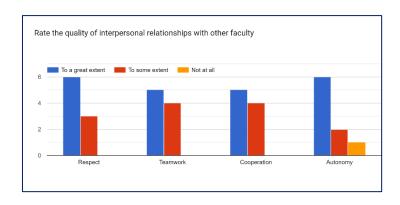
#### GRAPH F12 CAMPUS SAFETY

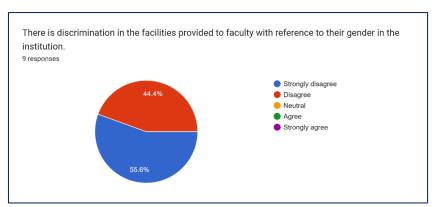

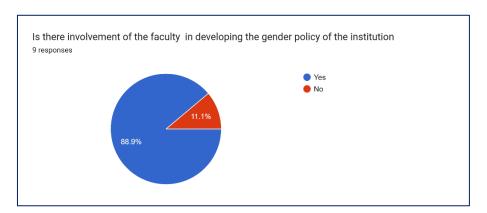
# GRAPH F 15 GENDER DISCRIMINATION

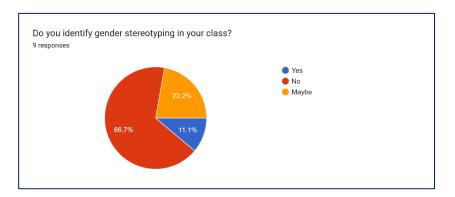
#### GRAPH F 16 GENDER POLICY

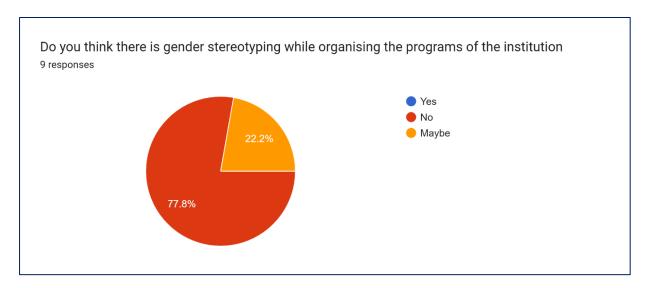

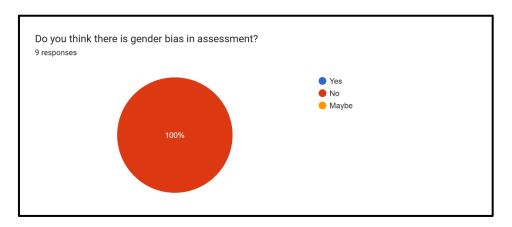
GRAPH F18 GENDER STEREOTYPING - B

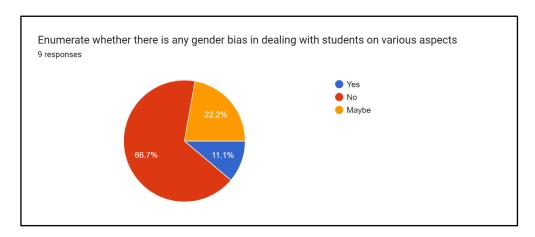

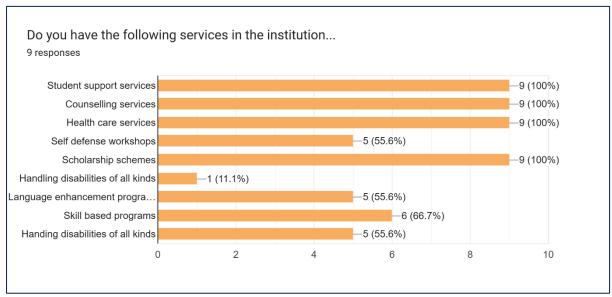

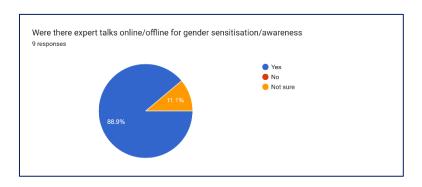

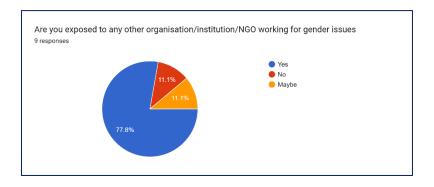
#### GRAPH F22 GENDER SENSITIVE PROGRAMS

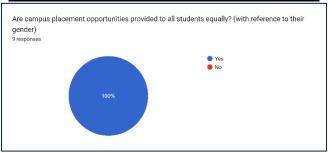
GRAPH F21 COLLABORATION FOR GENDER ISSUES

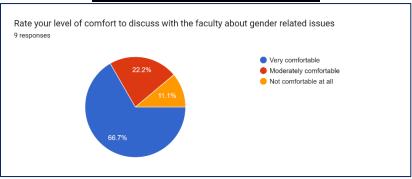

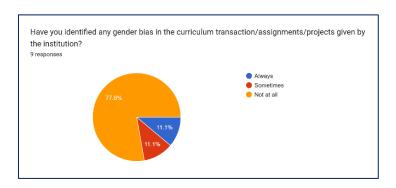

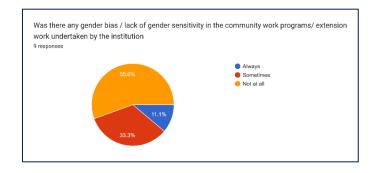

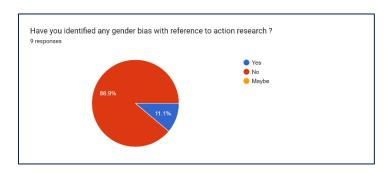

#### GRAPH F25 GENDER BIAS -COMMUNITY WORK



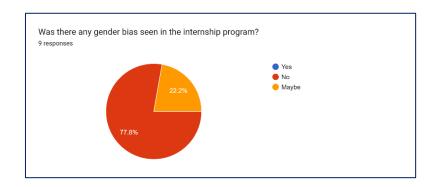

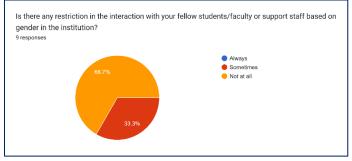
GRAPH F27 GENDER BIAS - INTERNSHIP

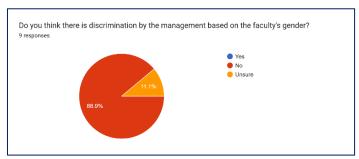

GENDER BASED INTERACTION



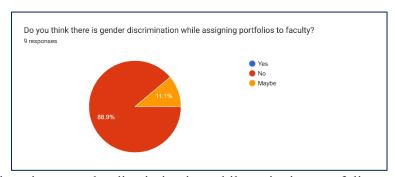

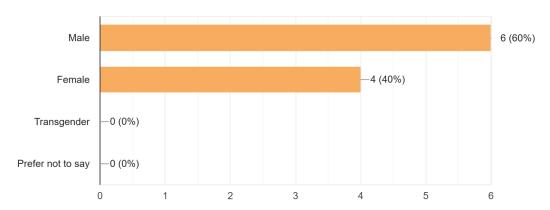

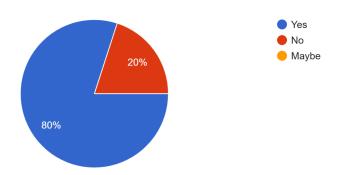

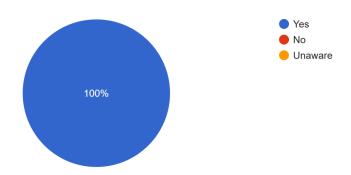

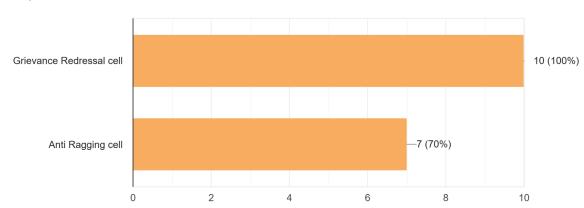

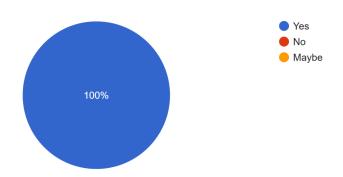

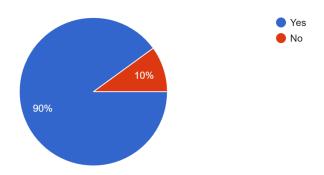

GRAPH SS6 - Awareness of Gender Inclusive Policy via website in the Institution

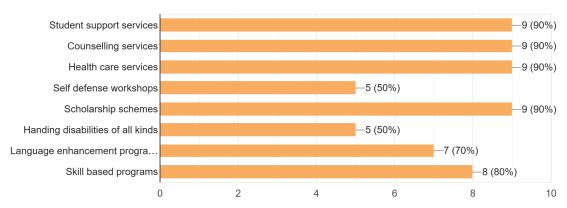

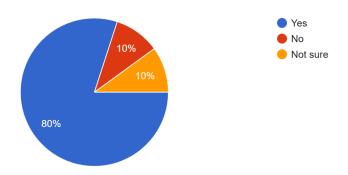

GRAPH SS8- Pie chart showing Gender Sensitive programs conducted in the Institution

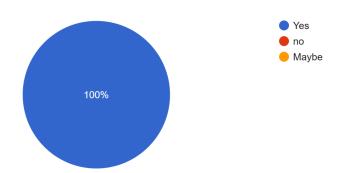

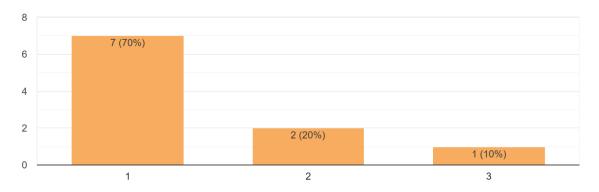

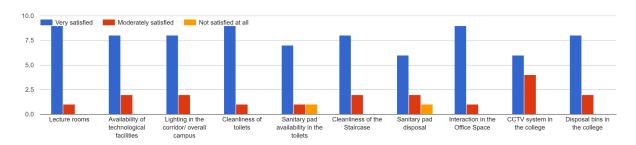

GRAPH SS 11 Bar Graph showing satisfaction with infrastructure in the Institution

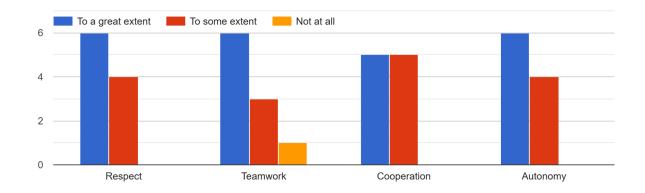
Are you satisfied with the following infrastructural facilities on your campus?

GRAPH SS 12- Bar Graph showing Interpersonal relationship in the Institution

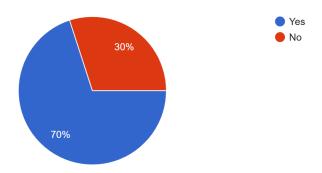

Is there involvement of the support staff in developing the gender policy of the institution 10 responses

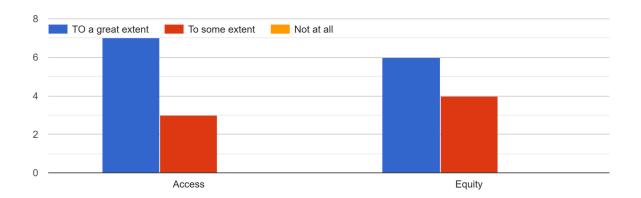

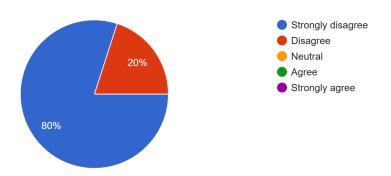

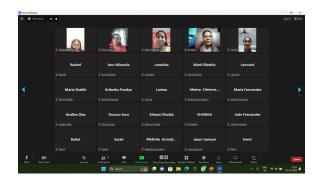

On Thursday, 18th January,2024 the students of F.Y.B.Ed (Batch 2023-24) were taken for a film screening at the esteemed Sophia's College for Women (empowered autonomous), Cumballa Hill. 'The Kashish Forward: A Queer Film Festival', RUSA sponsored by the Kashish Arts Foundation for the LGBTQ+ community showcased seven selected films by independent filmmakers from Ireland,Canada,USA and India. The short films centered around the life experiences of people belonging to the LGBTQUIA+ community. The duration of the event was from 1pm to 4pm.



#### The curated movies were as follows:

1. Your love by Sudeep Morrison - A depiction of Lesbian love wherein the women were forcibly married to heterosexual partners in order to curb their sexuality. However, they are reunited in old age by one of their granddaughters. The highlight of the movie was its presentation in the form of a groovy song and vibrant visuals. The filmmaker attempted to portray parental and societal restrictions on queer love but also showed how life comes full circle and even queer people are worthy of a happy ending in their love stories.

- 2. **Panic attack** Trans Masculinity was depicted wherein a young person identifying as a trans man finds it difficult to gain acceptance in society. The director used a nuanced lens to show the little, often ignored ways in which heteronormative society isolates trans people thereby making them subalterns. The simplicity of the situation along with the grappling use of emotions was indeed very touching.
- 3. **Beach by Anisha Sharma** A girl undergoes breast augmentation surgery to become a boy as she identifies as a boy. The trans man's journey is one of empowerment and freedom as he shows the courage to finally embrace his true self through a simple gesture of being shirtless on the beach, without inhibitions and fear of judgment of his 'new body.' Additionally, the director told the audience that the transman who played the protagonist was a real trans man from Ahmedabad.
- 4. **Together / Apart by David Amberg -** This unique animation follows an attack on a young gay couple that creates scars for one of them that are unhealed. It depicts losing parts of oneself and becoming whole through queer love as one of the lovers is unable to live his truth but finally accepts it, leading to the marriage of the gay couple.
- 5. **Marigold by Abhinav Dubey** A sensual portrayal of lesbian love showing married women in a lesbian affair, including themes of love and longing in secrecy, this short film was based in rural India.
- 6. **Raja bhau by Sridhar Rangayan** It was a documentary of Merlin Mandavkar following a trans man's story of acceptance. One pivotal aspect of this short was when he spoke about gender biased school uniforms that forced him to hide his identity. He was born a girl, grew breasts and got periods too. So he decided to go in for testosterone hormone injections which made his voice like a man and he grew a beard. Eventually he underwent a whole body surgery. It was heartwarming to see his parents, grandmother,brother, extended family etc realize his true sexual identity and then accept it and love him for it.
- 7. Malwa Khushan by Preeti Kanungo and Sourav Yadav Malwa and Khushan are depicted as two sisters with different sexual identities. Khushan is straight while Malwa is discovering herself and leaning towards lesbiansism. It is a very innocent movie on first love, teenage crushes and sweet gestures. Kanungo, the director herself hails from Madhya Pradesh so

she decided to make a film using local artistes. Yadav, the director of photography, told the audience that the parents were educated about the content of the film and they loved their daughters' work.



After the movies were played, a short interview followed by the Q&A round with the audience was a part of the event. It was quite insightful and wonderful to hear insider's perspectives on the treatment of the LGBTQ+ community in India. The major points were :

- 1. Educators need to promote gender sensitization through curriculum and teaching methods.
- 2. Many multinational corporations are funding LGBTQ+ work in the spirit of inclusion.
- 3. Educating the masses about the LGBTQ+ community is essential.



The head of the Department of Sociology of the college, Prof.Ivan John was instrumental in organizing the event. Eminent theatre personality, Dolly Thakore and senior filmmaker, Suhail Abbas are key sponsors of the KASHISH Foundation, founded in 2010 by Sridhar Rangayan and his partner of 29 years, Sagar.
